Rector's Message

Dear Ascension Family:

While sitting at my desk to prepare this message, an image popped into my mind, and whenever I tried to brush it off and concentrate, it came back again and again. So, here it is. It was sometime in 1984. I was still in the Army, I was in touch with the Bishop of La Rochelle about seminary, and he sent me to spend a full week in a Benedictine monastery in the Basque region. There, daily, I had a time of discussion with the prior, to assess whether I really had a vocation to the priesthood. He asked me how I could see myself as a priest, and I started to explain what I had in mind. This is the vivid memory that popped in my mind suddenly this morning, because after all these years, I can still remember the vision I had of the priesthood. I saw myself as the rector of a small church in a village in the countryside. It was peaceful and easy with the celebration of the Mass on Sunday and on weekdays, visiting the parishioners, all within walking distance, doing pastoral care and counseling, celebrating funerals, baptisms, and weddings. The Prior smiled, and told me that there was very little chance that my vision would happen. He was so right! Even after years of seminary, including 2 full years in a parish, I had no clue about what my ministry would be. It was never boring, and rarely two days were exactly the same.

In France, during my six years of active ministry, I was never in a small church or a small village, and my parishioners were never within walking distance. I spent time in my car going from one place to another, learning new skills, discovering new people, and celebrating sacraments, sometimes wondering what I was doing because the many people I buried, married, and baptized, *(Continued on p. 2)*

were not church goers. But this vision of a small peaceful small church, with lots of time in my hands to read, pray, meditate, and encounter people, is still stuck in my head.

When I started my ministry in the United States in July 2014, I had 2 weeks when I was able to breathe, read, and pray as much as I wanted because there was nothing for me to do, except to become familiar with the church and the people. That did not last, and that did not occur ever again.

Looking back, I realize how much my vision of the priesthood was not realistic, or belonged to another time. It reminds me that deep within me there is a desire to experience peace, a thirst for quiet time, and a regular prayer life that is not always possible in the business of a priest's life, and to be honest, with the business of anybody's life. I had to learn many skills that were not taught at seminary, from leading meetings to being a summer camp director for 50 kids, organizing and leading pilgrimages for teens and college students, to teaching "sacred studies" at an Episcopal school for middle schoolers. Somehow all these things were related to the day-to-day ministry. They were different ways of being with people and preaching the Good News of Jesus Christ.

One thing that I did not expect when I began my ministry as an Episcopal rector, was the ministry of money. I already shared with you part of my stewardship journey, from giving almost nothing out of obligation to being a tither. But struggling year after year with the finances of a parish, inviting people to be as generous as they can over and over again, and dealing with deficit budgets even when people are being generous; this is sometimes so discouraging.

The Vestry is finalizing the budget for 2025, our dream was to have a balanced budget, but that might not be possible again. The Finance Committee, the Vestry, and the various committees are doing their best to address the situation, and we will have new fundraisers during the year. So, I'm hopeful.

I was so naive about the ministry 41 years ago! I'm glad that I did not know what it would be like, how demanding it would be, and how far the Lord would lead me and my family. If I had known, I might have run away! (Continued on p. 3)

I'm thankful for the various opportunities that were presented to me, and the many ways the Lord challenged me. No regrets whatsoever. But, about the financial health of Ascension, this is our common challenge, if we want Ascension not only to pursue its mission, but also to grow in number and discipleship, if we want Ascension to be able to attract families with children and youth, if we want Ascension to be a place where the love of God is embodied, I have to ask you once again: please be as generous as you can!

However, there are several critical team lead positions which must be filled by March 31 so that training can begin to support the successful transitions for this year's Mart. The organization, planning and coordination activities for these specific areas can begin as early as late spring / early summer. If these lead positions are not filled by March 31, we will not be able to hold the Mart.

These open positions are:

Tear Down / Set Up – to replace Kevin & Jackie Weschler for this year

Plans, coordinates and develops a team to organize and take down the HCH altar & pew chairs as well as furniture from the Fellowship Hall, parlor, classrooms and offices before the Mart and then sets up afterwards. Is on site to provide instructions to the movers when the furniture is picked up before the Mart for off-site storage and then delivered back to Ascension after the Mart. Provides physical assistance to MM team leads when requested to pull their items from the MM closet to prepare for the Mart and place packed boxes back in the MM closet afterwards. 1700th Anniversary of the Nicene Creed

Did you know that the Nicene Creed that we proclaim each Sunday was partially written by the bishops gathered by the Emperor Constantine for what became the First Ecumenical Council? This first gathering of bishops

representing the whole Church took place in the city of



Nicaea (now İznik, Turkey) from May to the end of July 325, 1,700 years ago. One of the goals of this first official Creed was to proclaim the orthodox (right) faith against the position of the priest Arius and his allies for whom the Son was not of the same nature as the Father. As a consequence of the Council, the Church was divided between those who accepted the Council and those who rejected it.

The Second Ecumenical Council, held in 381 in Constantinople, made some changes to the original text, adding several paragraphs (from *the Lord, the giver of life* to *amen*.) The revised Creed, known as the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed, became the official creed of both the western part of the Church (speaking Latin) and the Eastern part (speaking Greek). This Creed was reaffirmed during the Third Ecumenical Council of Ephesus in 451.

The west later added a sentence to the Creed that was never approved by an Ecumenical council, and therefore rejected by the east. This is known as the "Filioque" controversy, a Latin term meaning "and from the Son." In the original Greek version, the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father. This addition of the Filioque unilaterally by the Western Church is one of the causes of the Great Schism that broke the Church in 1054. Some churches use the singular: I believe, but both original versions of 325 and 381 use the plural: we believe.

This anniversary is a good opportunity to study the history of the Creed, and to be united with all the churches who proclaim the same faith. The World Council of Churches is organizing events and conferences to celebrate this 1700th anniversary.

After a prayer led by the Senior Warden, the Vestry approved the Consent Agenda including the minutes from December 17, 2024, the list of the resolutions for 2024, reports from the Rector, Senior Warden, Altar Guild, Mistletoe Mart, the appointment of Sophie Buisson to the Timber Ridge Apartments Board, and a flyer about Black History month organized by the ecumenical Westminster Ministerium.

Debbie Bargar, Chair of the Finance Committee, gave a report for 2024, and answered the various questions from the Vestry. We ended 2024 with a deficit of \$42,130.98. As of December 31, 2024, we have \$189,071.07 of restricted funds. Then Debbie presented a first draft of the budget for 2025. The initial projected deficit is \$53,062. That allowed a great and lengthy discussion. Given the situation it was decided not to give a raise for the staff in 2025. Each vestry member was invited to review the budget of their committees to determine whether reductions could be made. Debbie will keep working on the budget, and we hope to finalize a budget before the Annual Parish Meeting.

The Vestry nominees are: Mark Howe, Melissa Leahy, and Deborah Rio for a 3-year term, and David Anderson for a 2-year term. The Vestry approved a motion allowing Buildings and Grounds to obtain quotes for some needed work around our campus. We said the Lord's prayer before adjourning the meeting at 8:10 pm.

This is the 25th Anniversary of Women's Weekend and will focus on the theme Love in Action.






